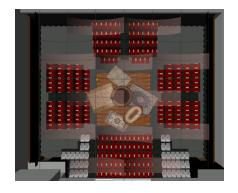

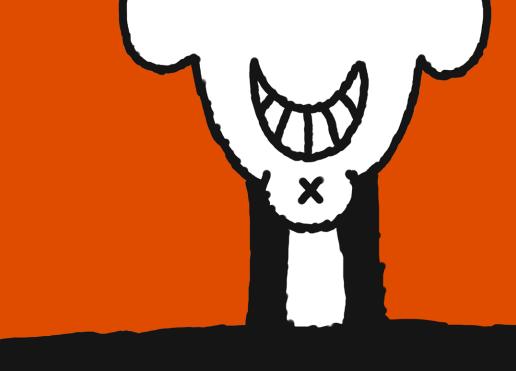

A New Spin on a Timeless Comedy

After coming into some money thanks in part to his government job with Expo 67, celebrating the 100th anniversary of Canadian Confederation, Orin and his family are living well on the Rez. But when the gullible patriarch welcomes the con artist Father Tartuffe into their home, his relatives must rally together to save themselves from the imposter's conniving ways. Can they snap Orin out of his delusions and expose Tartuffe's less-than-holy intentions? This fresh take on Molière's most popular play is guaranteed to delight.

Notes from the Directors

Hello, my name is Quelemia Sparrow. I'm from the Musqueam Nation and I'm a Co-Director of Father Tartuffe, an Indigenous Misadventure. Thank you for joining us at this Arts Club stage located in 'səńa?q", colonially known as Granville Island. səńa?q^w is the territory of the x^wməθk^wəýəm (Musqueam), Skwxwú7mesh (Squamish), and sə'lilwəta?4(Tsleil-Waututh) Nations. It is a place with rich history. It was known as a place with abundant food sources. There were oysters and clam beds and on summer nights you could hear the smelts swimming. They say the sound of the smelts was so loud it would travel across the water and could be heard far off in the distance.

But what I connect to the most in səńa?q is the beauty it holds being that in this area the women used to cultivate camas lily fields. The camas lilies had these pretty flowers. Some of the lilies were white and some were blue but the women loved the blue ones the best because they were the prettiest. This place holds the wisdom of women and the power of our matriarchal societies.

Here on these lands we are sharing with you an Indigenous adaptation of Tartuffe. I have always loved Molière. As an actor, director and writer my favourite genre is comedy. As an Indigenous person whose work and lived experience is inherently political I have always been drawn to satire and farce as a means to provoke and create social change. Indigenous folks are funny. We love to laugh. We have an incredible ability to find humour amidst tragedy and through our laughter we can, often times, alchemize the darkness to into light. Anyone who has witnessed a group of Aunties gathering knows this to be true.

Molière's *Tartuffe* was banned and burned. Leaders of the Catholic Church condemned the comedy as an attack on religion. While Molière maintained that he was attacking hypocrisy not religion the battle to gain public presentation raged for almost five years. One might say Molière is against extremes, that he was satirizing fanatic faith, providing painful evidence of our ability to passionately defend our beliefs and anything that threatens them. Today it is the political rather than the religious world where extremism and hypocrisy thrive.

In Tartuffe Cleante exclaims: ...'you never manage to take the middle course, it seems, but jump instead between absurd extremes'

Herbie Barnes' adaptation of *Tartuffe* makes a smart commentary on patriarchy and the colonization of matriarchy in our culture. Set in 1967, a time when the tension between the continuing movement of activism and the fight for sovereignty of Indigenous peoples was in direct opposition to the agenda of the Canadian Government to assimilate Indigenous folks into the dominant culture. Indeed, one could say, it was a necessary survival tactic for Indigenous folks to assimilate in order to succeed in the oppressor's society.

In this version of *Tartuffe* the women see clearer than our assimilated patriarch. And there couldn't be a more appropriate play to stage on these lands, where the camas lilies were cultivated by strong, Indigenous matriarchs.

QUELEMIA SPARROW co-director

Although most of my professional life has been working on new Canadian Plays, Molière has always been my favourite classical playwright. I love his biting satire, social commentary, and his brilliant way of exploring folly and humanity in an aspiring yet often selfcentred world. Tartuffe the play was loved by audiences, but also notorious when first performed. Molière was pretty much cancelled for several years. The church accused Tartuffe of being anti-religious whereas Moliere insisted his play was unmasking religious hypocrisy. There is no shortage of people manipulating others for personal gain and Tartuffe remains as relevant as ever. Scammers and opportunists are everywhere and cleverly prey on the vulnerable, promising rewards and spiritual contentment that can feel so elusive.

Like Molière, Herbie Barnes is a playwright, actor, and director with an innate sense of comic irony. We love his ingenious take on the story, setting it on a reservation in 1967, in the shadow of EXPO 67, celebrating one hundred years of Confederation, when only seven years before, Indigenous people were finally granted the right to vote. Herbie artfully explores this time of change and the tension between the promises of material prosperity and retaining one's cultural values. As with Moliere's original, the life lessons are delivered with hilarity and gusto.

The project is a large-scale endeavour and we were thrilled that Ashlie and the Arts Club team were enthusiastic about partnering with Touchstone Theatre to premiere Herbie's play. The Arts Club generously supports the local theatre community and smaller companies and we are grateful to be working with their talented and committed staff. Musqueam artist

Quelemia Sparrow was on the top of my list as a collaborator. I love watching her on-stage and her practice as a writer, director, and advocate make her a dream partner. We immediately started imagining some of our incredible Indigenous actors taking on Father Tartuffe's bold yet vulnerable roles. We've assembled a wonderful team, comprised of people from many Indigenous nations and settler backgrounds, and it's a great honour to bring you Father Tartuffe: An Indigenous Misadventure.

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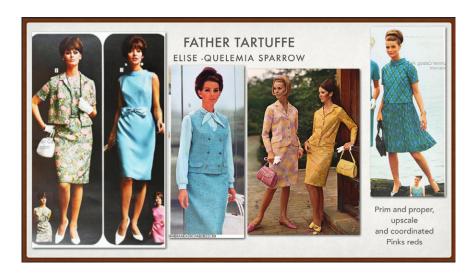




The Role of Costumes

The Riveting True Story of a Theatre Pioneer

It's 1833, and at London's Theatre Royal, Ira Aldridge is making history by becoming the first Black actor to tread the boards as Shakespeare's *Othello*. As the public and parliament debate the abolition of slavery, how will audiences react to the revolution already taking place on the stage? Be transported to the tempestuous Covent Garden rehearsal hall in this thought-provoking and captivating play within a play about the little-known but true story of the groundbreaking performer.

Ira Aldridge: A Short Biography

Ira Aldridge was born in 1807 in New York City, where he attended the African Free School. This school was established and run by the New-York Manumission Society, an early advocate for the emancipation of slaves in America; its original members in 1785 had included Alexander Hamilton. During Aldridge's teenage years, he became involved with the African Company, a short-lived Black theatrical troupe that faced violent hostility from some New Yorkers, including its Sheriff, leading to its dissolution. Nevertheless, this early experience instilled in Aldridge a serious passion for dramatic performance and gave him the opportunity to learn from the talented African-American actor James Hewlett, who had co-founded the African Company with William Henry Brown.

Aldridge discovered better prospects for on-stage success abroad, setting sail for Britain in 1824. Officially, the thenseventeen-year-old Aldridge travelled as the valet to a British-American actor named James William Wallack. Aldridge soon left England for Scotland. After studying theatre at the University of Glasgow, he set his sights on the stages of London, particularly the Royal Coburg Theatre (later renamed the Royal Victoria Theatre, today the Old Vic). It was there that he came to be regarded as one of the greatest Shakespearean actors of his time, starring in such premier roles as Othello, King Lear, Macbeth, and Shylock in The Merchant of Venice. Aldridge became known especially as a masterful tragic actor, both in Shakespearean and more modern parts.

Following decades of success touring throughout Britain, Aldridge, from the 1850s forward, turned his attention more toward the Continent, performing-often for prominent figures, including heads of state-from Belgium and Switzerland to Serbia and Russia. Aldridge used his considerable fame to speak out against the ills of slavery and racism, especially in his country of birth, the United States, where tensions concerning slavery were then boiling over and threatening to tear the republic apart. He was twice married-first to an Englishwoman named Margaret Gill, then after Gill's death to a Swedish countess, Amanda Brandt-and fathered at least six children. Aldridge died in 1867 in Łódź, Poland, where he was buried at the Łódź Old Cemetery. Aldridge's legacy endured in Europe, where his daughters Amanda Aldridge and Luranah Aldrige found fame as accomplished opera singers, and back in America, where numerous Black theatrical troupes, during and after the Civil War, named themselves in honour of the revered Aldridge.

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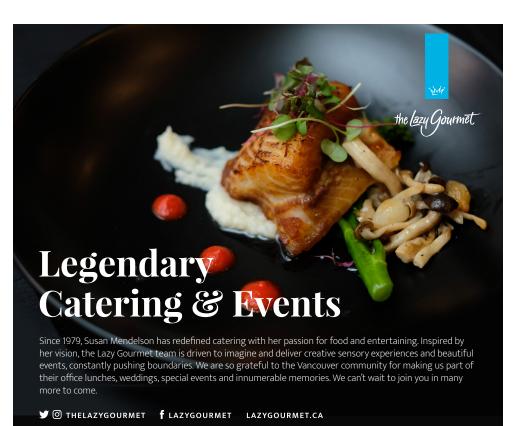
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
